



Associate Vice President *for* Undergraduate Education

LEADERSHIP PROFILE

This leadership profile is intended to provide information about Illinois State University and the position of associate vice president for Undergraduate Education. It is designed to assist qualified individuals in assessing their interest in this position.



About Illinois State University

On February 18, 1857, Illinois Gov. William Bissell signed a bill creating a normal school and establishing the Board of Education of the state of Illinois as its governing body. The bill stipulated that the permanent location would be the place that offered the most favorable inducements. Jesse W. Fell took up the campaign for Bloomington and obtained financial backing totaling \$141,000. Abraham Lincoln, acting as attorney for the Board, drew up the bond guaranteeing the Bloomington citizens would fulfill their financial pledges. Illinois State University was consequently founded as the first public institution of higher education in the state.

Established as a teacher education institution, Illinois State has developed into a multipurpose university with degree programs at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels. Seven colleges offer approximately 191 undergraduate majors, 110 master's programs, 20 doctoral degrees, and 42 certificate options. One of 12 public universities in Illinois, the alumni base has now grown to more than 243,000.

In fall 2025, Illinois State welcomed its largest freshman class in university history and enrolled a total of 21,994 students. Illinois State's students appreciate the average 19:1 student-faculty ratio. Professors teach in the classroom, mentor, and partner with both undergraduates and graduates in research endeavors. Within the faculty, 98 percent hold a terminal degree in their field. Students return to campus and progress through their degree programs, as shown

by the University's high fall 2024 to fall 2025 retention rate of new, full-time, first-time-in-college students of 81.9 percent. Illinois State is also praised for providing an affordable education, with *Washington Monthly* honoring the University as one of the Best Bang for the Buck Colleges in the Midwest. There are many other reasons that reveal Illinois State's competitive advantage as a premier undergraduate institution—from record-breaking fundraising to student civic engagement and scholarly breakthroughs. Each explains the reason Illinois State University is "Redbird Proud."

Illinois State affirms and encourages community belonging and a respect for differences. The University fosters an inclusive environment characterized by cultural understanding and engagement, ethical behavior, and a commitment to social justice. The University supports a diverse faculty and staff who mentor a diverse student population. The institution endeavors to provide opportunities for students, staff, and faculty to participate productively in a global society and be civically engaged.

Campus diversity at Illinois State increasingly reflects the nation's changing demographics. In fall 2025, nearly 44 percent of new, full-time, first-time-in-college students came from traditionally underrepresented groups. Students are mentored by a faculty that includes numerous teacher-scholars recognized at national and international levels, all dedicated to superior teaching.





Community

Illinois State is in the Central Illinois community of Bloomington-Normal, which has a combined population of 132,000. The community is home to Illinois Wesleyan University, Heartland Community College, OSF St. Joseph Medical Center, Carle BroMenn Medical Center, Rivian Motors, COUNTRY Financial, and State Farm Insurance Corporate Headquarters. The community has distinguished itself for its outstanding school systems and educational attainment, parks and recreation, health care, job growth, economic opportunity, and low crime. The University's hometown was ranked as one of the top three [best college towns in America](#) based on its affordability and safety, while its entertainment scene, community, and quality of life are listed as reasons it also ranks as one of the [Best Places to Live in the United States](#).

There are plentiful activities, cultural events, and entertainment opportunities for students and staff locally, with more opportunity to explore nearby. Normal is centrally located in Illinois, making it possible to drive or catch a train to major cities such as Chicago, St. Louis, and Indianapolis. All are within 2-3 hours from campus. Public transportation systems make the community easily

accessible, with a train and bus station within a few blocks of campus. There is also a regional airport with free parking that removes many of the hassles of flying. For more information on our community, please visit [visitbn.org](#).

Ranked the No. 3 Best Small City for Job-Seeking College Grads, Bloomington-Normal offers multiple opportunities for students upon graduation. Illinois State partners with companies in the area, including State Farm Insurance and COUNTRY Financial—both with headquarters in the community—to provide internships and employment.

There are ample leisure activities as well, with five public golf courses in the area, several lakes, and the 45-plus miles of the hard-surfaced Constitution Trail. Converted from an abandoned railroad, the trail is bustling with individuals walking, biking, running, and blading. There are numerous restaurants and shops to visit as well. Uptown Normal is home to locally owned retail outlets with quality products and delectable food. There are unique movies, concerts, theatrical performances, and festivals to attend in every season.



Academics

Illinois State University is currently composed of seven academic colleges and Milner Library, each of which contains academic departments and centers designed to provide—singly and collectively—a comprehensive and robust academic experience for students. The University's academic programs are supported by the services and collections of Milner Library.

College of Applied Sciences and Technology houses the Department of Agriculture, Department of Criminal Justice Sciences, Department of Family and Consumer Sciences, Department of Health Sciences, School of Information Technology, School of Kinesiology and Recreation, Department of Military Science, and Department of Technology. The college also includes several significant centers, including the University Farm; Horticulture Center; the Child Care Center; and Illinois State's well-known Gamma Phi Circus, the nation's oldest collegiate circus.

College of Arts and Sciences houses 16 departments and offers many majors and minors at the undergraduate level. Some of these programs are interdisciplinary, including African American Studies; Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies; and Latin American and Latina/o Studies. Many departments have graduate programs leading to master's and doctoral degrees. The college houses many of Illinois State's study abroad opportunities, the Center for Child Welfare and Adoption Studies, and the University's NPR radio station, WGLT.

College of Business is known for its comprehensive undergraduate programs, highly regarded master's programs, and the

outstanding accomplishments of its alumni. It is one of only 188 business colleges in the world to hold both business and accounting accreditation by AACSB International. It is also the only college of business in a public university in Illinois that has earned STEM designation for all its master's programs.

College of Education prepares early childhood through middle-level teachers, special educators, and administrators in addition to partnering with departments across the University to offer teacher education programs in a wide variety of academic programs and areas of study. With 44 accredited teacher education programs and offerings at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels, Illinois State remains true to its founding as Illinois State Normal University, specializing in teacher education. The College of Education is also home to Metcalf and University High School Laboratory Schools serving approximately 1,000 students.

College of Engineering enrolled its first cohort of students in fall 2025 with an initial offering of electrical, mechanical, and general engineering degree programs. The college is uniquely designed with a vision of student success, inclusive excellence, and workforce development. Leveraging Illinois State's reputation as a student-focused institution, the College of Engineering prepares students for success by melding theory and practice in core engineering disciplines and innovative cross-disciplinary experiences.

Mennonite College of Nursing offers nursing degrees at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels. Building on the rich history of nursing education at Mennonite College, established in 1919, the College of Nursing was incorporated into the University in 1999 as Illinois

State's sixth academic college. The college is proud of NCLEX and FNP pass rates consistently exceeding state and national averages and offers a state-of-the-art Nursing Simulation Center with a range of clinical placements that prepare students to practice in a complex health care system.

Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts includes the Wonsook Kim School of Art; the School of Music; School of Theatre, Dance, and Film; and the School of Creative Technologies. University Galleries, the Illinois Shakespeare Festival, Theatre for Young Audiences, the String Project, and the Big Red Marching Machine are also housed within the Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts. Notable alumni include Jane Lynch, Sean Hayes, Brendan Hunt, Nicolas Africano, LaRoyce Hawkins, Gary Cole, Judith Ivey, Terry Kinney, John Malkovich, Laurie Metcalf, Jeff Perry, Cecilia Suárez, and Michelle Williams.

Milner Library personnel work closely with academic units to provide services and research materials across the academic spectrum. Subject liaisons collaborate with faculty in all colleges, schools, and departments on information fluency instruction, collection management, and research assistance. Group study areas, quiet floors, collaboration stations, and a technology-rich environment support varied student learning styles. Library resources support textbook affordability initiatives, open-access publishing, and primary source research. Milner is home to distinctive collections in Special Collections and the University Archives as well as a Federal Depository Collection of government information beginning in 1858.

Strategic Plan

The University's strategic plan, *Excellence by Design: 2024-2030*, approved by the Board of Trustees in the spring of 2024, is a shining example of the University's commitment to shared governance, with faculty, staff, students, and campus stakeholders playing an active role in contributing to the creation of the document. Guided by a strong foundational design and building on our past strategic plan, *Educate • Connect • Elevate: Illinois State: 2018-2023*, the plan emphasizes Illinois State's commitment to excellence through continued improvement to shape an exciting future.

Excellence by Design: 2024-2030 lists our seven core values: Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Scholarship; Individualized Attention; Equity, Diversity, Access, and Belonging; Collaboration; Community and Civic Engagement; Respect; and Integrity. By acting on these values, we create a learning environment that results in our university being the first-choice public university in Illinois for high-achieving, motivated students who seek an individualized educational experience combined with the resources of a large university.

With its four strategic directions—Cultivate a Culture of Success and Belonging, Foster a Culture of Responsible Stewardship, Elevate Our Institutional Excellence, and Expand Mutually Beneficial Partnerships—*Excellence by Design: 2024-2030* serves as a practical guide for all units within the University for planning and resource allocation decisions. This plan guides Illinois State as it forges a new educational path across the next six years.

Master Plan

The Master Plan presents a long-range blueprint for the physical development of Illinois State University—its future size, form, function, character, image, and environment. The plan presents a series of recommendations designed to further the University's physical transformation beyond what has been accomplished in recent years. These recommendations have been tailored to support and enhance the University's strategic plan.

FIRST-CHOICE INSTITUTION

Illinois State has welcomed our largest freshman class in history. We enroll 21,994 students, while maintaining academic quality and small class sizes.



BANG FOR THE BUCK

Illinois State is ranked among the top universities for return on investment. *U.S. News & World Report* recognized the University as one of the Best Value Schools in the nation, and *Washington Monthly* included the University on the Best Bang for the Buck list in the Midwest. In addition, the University was also ranked among the top 30 percent of four-year higher education institutions for graduates' return on investment.



HIGH RETENTION AND GRADUATION RATES

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Illinois State University, a nationally ranked public R2 university committed to teaching, scholarship, civic engagement, and inclusive excellence, invites applications and nominations for the position of associate vice president for Undergraduate Education (AVPUE). The University recognizes that our commitment to the inclusion of all students, faculty, and staff enriches the educational and cultural experiences of the entire campus and greater community. To that end, we invite applications from individuals who share these values and will work to advance the university's continued commitment to equity, diversity, access, and belonging for all.

Reporting directly to the provost and serving as a key member of the academic leadership team, the AVPUE provides visionary and collaborative leadership to advance undergraduate student success, teaching excellence, and curricular innovation across the University.

The AVPUE will play a central role in realizing Illinois State's *Excellence by Design: (2024–2030)* strategic plan, which emphasizes student success, institutional distinction, and a culture of belonging. This is a defining opportunity to shape the undergraduate experience at a comprehensive, research-active university committed to access, equity, and excellence for all.

The AVPUE provides strategic leadership for student retention and success initiatives; directs

the University's General Education program; collaborates with the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, the Council for Teacher Education, and the Council on General Education; and works with college deans to ensure appropriate instructional capacity for General Education and intersession (summer and winter) courses.

The AVPUE serves as liaison to an Academic Senate internal committee and collaborates with and supports the provost and other members of the Academic Affairs leadership team within the framework of shared governance.

The ideal candidate for this role should be prepared for potential changes in their portfolio as the institution undergoes a time of transformation. The successful candidate will be a team player who is adaptable and can manage competing priorities effectively while demonstrating flexibility and a collaborative spirit. The next AVPUE should be an individual who exhibits the collegiality, competence, and professionalism of a senior administrator in the Division of Academic Affairs. This individual should understand and be prepared to navigate the rapidly changing landscape of higher education, while contributing to the institution's evolution and long-term success.

The preferred start date for the position is June 1, 2026.

Illinois State University student success profile

Illinois State University embraces student success, access, and belonging, maintaining some of the highest retention and graduation rates in the state and among public universities nationwide. Guided by the University's strategic plan, *Excellence by Design: 2024–2030*, Illinois State's approach to student success is intentionally holistic—uniting academic excellence, personal support, and community connection to ensure that every student has the opportunity to thrive.

With an undergraduate enrollment of more than 19,500 students, Illinois State serves a diverse population representing every region of Illinois and a growing national and international presence. The University consistently ranks among the top institutions in the Midwest for student satisfaction and degree completion, with first-to-second-year retention rates near 82% and four- and six-year graduation rates exceeding national averages. These outcomes reflect a deeply embedded culture of individualized attention, where student achievement is supported through proactive advising, high-impact learning experiences, and responsive academic and personal supports.

Illinois State's student success model integrates curricular and cocurricular engagement, leveraging programs such as *Redbird Life* to build connection and belonging from a student's first semester. Faculty and staff play an active role in mentoring, teaching, and guiding students through research, service learning, internships, and leadership opportunities that deepen their sense of purpose. Across the University, a shared focus on access and equity ensures that first-generation and Pell-eligible students are met with the resources and encouragement necessary for success.

Areas reporting to the associate vice president for Undergraduate Education

The associate vice president for Undergraduate Education (AVPUE) provides leadership and coordination for the University's undergraduate academic and student success infrastructure, advancing initiatives that promote high-quality learning, inclusive excellence, and timely degree completion. Areas reporting to or working closely with the AVPUE include the following:

- **University College:** Provides foundational first-year academic guidance that fosters early student success by being home to Academic Advising, the Julia N. Visor Academic Center, TRIO, retention services, and programs supporting exploratory students.
- **Honors Program:** Provides high-impact, interdisciplinary learning experiences that challenge and engage high-achieving students.
- **Registrar's Office:** Manages academic records, course registration, classroom scheduling, and degree certification, ensuring the integrity and accuracy of student data; supports the implementation of academic policies; facilitates curriculum processes; and provides critical data and services that enable students' timely progression and graduation.
- **Advising Advocacy and Technology:** Works with academic advisors across campus to enhance the use of technology, improve advising services, conduct training and development, assist with transfer students, and improve time-to-degree efforts.

Through these areas, the AVPUE ensures that Illinois State's undergraduate education remains student-centered, innovative, and inclusive by aligning academic programs and support services to sustain the University's record of excellence and its deep commitment to student success.

- a. Assess and lead efforts to improve retention, persistence, and graduation outcomes, with particular attention to first-generation, and Pell-eligible students.
- b. Oversee student retention and time to degree initiatives in collaboration with the associate vice president for Enrollment Management.

Teaching and learning excellence

- a. Partner with the Center for Integrated Professional Development Scholarly Teaching and Online and Extended Learning Units to advance evidence-based, inclusive, and technology-enhanced teaching practices.

Curricular innovation and coherence

- a. Ensure degree pathways remain relevant and rigorous, and promote integrative learning that connects classroom, experiential, and career preparation.
- b. Oversee academic support programming through University College, including first-year and undeclared student advising, tutoring, academic transition and orientation services.
- c. Oversee graduation requirements such as AMALI and IDEAS requirements.

Implementation and assessment of learning in General Education

- a. Coordinate General Education, including curriculum development, implementation of program changes, program delivery, and program assessment in collaboration with the Council on General Education, University Assessment Services, and the Registrar's Office.

- b. Provide oversight for assessment of student learning and program quality within the general education program, ensuring alignment with accreditation standards and continuous improvement.

Leadership and collaboration across the Divisions of Academic and Student Affairs

- a. Provide leadership for Enrollment Management and Academic Services (EMAS) in support of university and undergraduate program enrollment and student success.
- b. Build strong partnerships across divisions to support the whole student, integrating academic and cocurricular strategies for success.
- c. Coordinate undergraduate advising in collaboration with the Academic Advising Council.
- d. Coordinate undergraduate programs in collaboration with deans, chairs, directors, faculty, and staff.
- e. Provide administrative leadership for undergraduate academic policies, degree requirements, and the undergraduate catalog.
- f. Serve as the administrator of the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, Council for Teacher Education, and Council on General Education curriculum committee.
- g. Supervise Advising, Advocacy, Innovation, and Technology; the Honors Program; the Office of the Registrar, and University College.

Qualifications *and* personal qualities

Required qualifications

1. A terminal degree from an accredited institution in a discipline related to the University's curricula.
2. A record of outstanding scholarship and teaching, meriting appointment as professor with tenure within a department or school at Illinois State University.
3. A record of full-time administrative leadership experience in dynamic academic organizations, with a record of accomplishments in roles such as dean, associate dean, department chair, school director, or a comparable full-time leadership role.
4. Leadership experience in undergraduate education with expertise in curriculum, general education, management of complex programs, or supervision of an academic area.
5. Demonstrated record of successful initiatives in support of student learning, engagement, and/or belonging.
6. A record of aligning fiscal resources with strategic priorities and demonstrated innovative fiscal management accomplishments in prior administrative roles.

Additional qualifications

1. Capacity for strategic thinking as evidenced by a record of making connections between programs, policies, and people to create coherent systems that support student success.
2. Evidence of applying data and assessment outcomes to guide strategy and decision making, evaluate impact, and support accountability.
3. Demonstrated capacity to embrace change, foster experimentation, and lead through evolving educational landscapes.
4. Record of an inclusive mindset and commitment to access and opportunity for all students.
5. Excellent interpersonal skills and adept at building trust and shared purpose with students, faculty, and staff including campus administrators.
6. Excellent oral and written communication skills, including ability to make effective public presentations and engage with the media.
7. Demonstrated commitment to shared governance, transparency, and fostering an inclusive and collegial environment.
8. Demonstrated commitment to advancing Illinois State University's core values: Excellence in Teaching, Learning and Scholarship; Individualized Attention; Equity, Diversity, Access, and Belonging; Collaboration; Community and Civic Engagement; Respect; and Integrity.

Dr. Aondover Tarhule, President



Dr. Aondover Tarhule joined Illinois State University in 2020 as vice president for academic affairs and provost and currently serves as president. His immediate prior administrative appointment was vice provost and dean of the Graduate School at Binghamton University (State University of New York). Before that, he was executive associate dean and department chair in the College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences at the University of Oklahoma. In these positions, he worked on creating new academic programs, increasing student enrollment, increasing diversity, faculty retention, shared governance, and international partnerships and linkages.

Having earned master's degrees and a doctoral degree in geography from McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, Tarhule received a postdoctoral fellowship from the Canadian Science Advisory Council to conduct research at Queens University in Kingston, Ontario, Canada. Tarhule earned an additional master's degree in environmental resources planning and a bachelor's degree in geography, both from the University of Jos, Plateau State, Nigeria.

A broadly trained physical geographer, Tarhule has wide-ranging research interests in hydroclimatic variability, droughts, water resources scarcity, and climate information dissemination and use. His scholarly research has appeared in prestigious international journals, including *Nature* (*Scientific Reports*, *Climate Perspectives*), *Journal of Hydrology*, *Remote Sensing*, and *Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society*, and book chapters. His efforts as principal investigator (PI) or co-PI have resulted in more than \$5 million in grants from such agencies as the National Science Foundation, the United States Agency for International Development, the National Institutes of Health, and the United States Geological Survey. He has served on the editorial board of the *Scientific World Journal* and the *African Geographical Review*, and as guest editor on several journals including *Remote Sensing*, *Atmosphere*, and *Climate Research*.

Tarhule has served on committees of prominent national and international organizations, including as consultant to the World Bank (Climate Risk Assessment of the Niger River Basin Sustainable Development Action Plan) and member of the Executive Committee of the Board on Oceans, Atmosphere, and Climate, and Association of Public and Land Grant Universities. He is a member of the College of Mentors of the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa (CODESRIA) and an executive board member of the Walker Institute, University of Reading, in England.

Dr. Ani Yazedjian, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost



Dr. Ani Yazedjian, University Professor, joined the Office of the Provost in 2019 as associate provost and currently serves as vice president for academic affairs and provost. In her role as associate provost, Yazedjian oversaw new program development through the Illinois Board of Higher Education and institutional accreditation through the Higher Learning Commission, and was actively involved in the creation of the new College of Engineering. On campus, she supervised the Center for Civic Engagement, the Office of International Education, and University Assessment Services. Yazedjian served on the University strategic planning steering team and the COVID-19 steering team.

Yazedjian has also served as chair of the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences at Illinois State. As chair, she led the increase in the number of degree programs in the department, developed the first accelerated master's degree programs on campus, created a new online dietetic internship certificate, increased student enrollment, oversaw over \$1 million in equipment and facilities upgrades, and secured donor contributions for five new scholarships. She was named a University Professor in 2013 and received the University's Distinguished Service Award in 2023.

Over the last two decades, Yazedjian has received over \$7 million to support her scholarly interests in delivering evidence-based programs to support adolescent development. Most recently, between 2015 and 2020, she directed the *CARE4U* program which provided over 1,100 primarily African American and Hispanic youth with relationship education, job readiness, and financial management skills in order to support their successful transition to adulthood. In 2021, she received the Marie F. Peters Award from the National Council on Family Relations, a biennial recognition given to a distinguished scholar, researcher, or practitioner who has made significant contributions to the area of racial and ethnic diversity in families.

Prior to her time at Illinois State, Yazedjian was a faculty member in the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences at Texas State University. In 2010, she was appointed as presidential fellow where she served on the president's cabinet and focused on developing and implementing internationalization efforts across campus.
