



About Illinois State University

n February 18, 1857, Illinois Gov. William Bissell signed a bill creating a normal school and establishing the Board of Education of the state of Illinois as its governing body. The bill stipulated that the permanent location would be the place that offered the most favorable inducements. Jesse W. Fell took up the campaign for Bloomington and obtained financial backing totaling \$141,000. Abraham Lincoln, acting as attorney for the Board, drew up the bond guaranteeing the Bloomington citizens would fulfill their financial pledges. Illinois State University was consequently founded as the first public institution of higher education in the state.

Established as a teacher education institution, Illinois State has developed into a multipurpose university with degree programs at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels. Seven colleges offer approximately 174 undergraduate majors, 97 master's programs, 17 doctoral degrees, and 40 certificate options. One of 12 public universities in Illinois, the alumni base has now grown to more than 235,000.

In fall 2024, Illinois State welcomed its largest freshman class in university history and enrolled a total of 21,546 students. Illinois State's students appreciate the average 19:1 student-faculty ratio. Professors teach in the classroom, mentor, and partner with both undergraduates and graduates in research endeavors. Within the faculty, 98 percent hold a terminal degree in their field. Additional examples of excellence include Illinois State placing in the top 100 on the 2024 *U.S. News & World Report* Best Value Schools-National Universities rankings. Students return to campus and complete their degrees, as

shown by the fact the University's retention rate is among the highest in the nation at 81.3 percent. Graduation rates are more than 66 percent, which is well above the national average. Illinois State is also praised for providing an affordable education, with Washington Monthly honoring the University as one of the Best Bang for the Buck Colleges in the Midwest. There are many other reasons that reveal Illinois State's competitive advantage as a premier undergraduate institution—from record-breaking fundraising to student civic engagement and scholarly breakthroughs. Each explains the reason Illinois State University is "Redbird Proud."

Illinois State affirms and encourages community belonging and a respect for differences. The University fosters an inclusive environment characterized by cultural understanding and engagement, ethical behavior, and a commitment to social justice. The University supports a diverse faculty and staff who mentor a diverse student population. The institution endeavors to provide opportunities for students, staff, and faculty to participate productively in a global society and be civically engaged.

Campus diversity at Illinois State increasingly reflects the nation's changing demographics. In the 2024-25 academic year, nearly 45 percent of the freshman class came from traditionally underrepresented groups. Over the past five years, there has been a 14 percent increase in African American students and a 9 percent increase in Latinx students. Students are mentored by a faculty that includes numerous teacher-scholars recognized at national and international levels, all dedicated to superior teaching.





Community

Illinois State is in the Central Illinois community of Bloomington-Normal, which has a combined population of 132,000. The community is home to Illinois Wesleyan University, Heartland Community College, OSF St. Joseph Medical Center, Carle BroMenn Medical Center, Rivian Motors, COUNTRY Financial, and State Farm Insurance Corporate Headquarters. The community has distinguished itself for its outstanding school systems and educational attainment, parks and recreation, health care, job growth, economic opportunity, and low crime. The University's hometown was ranked as one of the top three best college towns in America based on its affordability and safety, while its entertainment scene, community, and quality of life are listed as reasons it also ranks as one of the Best Places to Live in the United States.

There are plentiful activities, cultural events, and entertainment opportunities for students and staff locally, with more opportunity to explore nearby. Normal is centrally located in Illinois, making it possible to drive or catch a train to major cities such as Chicago, St. Louis, and Indianapolis. All are within 2-3 hours from campus. Public

transportation systems make the community easily accessible, with a train and bus station within a few blocks of campus. There is also a regional airport with free parking that removes many of the hassles of flying. For more information on our community, please visit visitbn.org.

Ranked the No. 3 Best Small City for Job-Seeking College Grads, Bloomington-Normal offers multiple opportunities for students upon graduation. Illinois State partners with companies in the area, including State Farm Insurance and COUNTRY Financial—both with headquarters in the community—to provide internships and employment.

There are ample leisure activities as well, with five public golf courses in the area, several lakes, and the 45-plus miles of the hard-surfaced Constitution Trail. Converted from an abandoned railroad, the trail is bustling with individuals walking, biking, running, and blading. There are numerous restaurants and shops to visit as well. Uptown Normal is home to locally owned retail outlets with quality products and delectable food. There are unique movies, concerts, theatrical performances, and festivals to attend in every season.





Academics

llinois State University is currently composed of seven academic colleges and Milner Library, each of which contains academic departments and centers designed to provide-singly and collectively—a comprehensive and robust academic experience for students. Degrees are offered at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels. Secondary education students major in their academic disciplines while completing their teacher preparation requirements under the auspices of the Council for Teacher Education. The University's academic programs are supported by the services and collections of Milner Library.

College of Applied Sciences and

Technology houses the Department of Agriculture, Department of Criminal Justice Sciences, Department of Family and Consumer Sciences, Department of Health Sciences, School of Information Technology, School of Kinesiology and Recreation, Department of Military Science, and Department of Technology. The college also includes several significant centers, including the University Farm; Horticulture Center; the Child Care Center; and Illinois State's well-known Gamma Phi Circus, the nation's oldest collegiate circus.

College of Arts and Sciences

houses 16 departments and offers many majors and minors at the undergraduate level. Some of these programs are interdisciplinary, including African American Studies; Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies; and Latin American and Latina/o Studies. Many departments have graduate programs leading to master's and doctoral degrees. The college houses many of Illinois State's study abroad opportunities, the Center for Child Welfare and Adoption Studies, and the University's NPR radio station, WGLT.

College of Business is known for its comprehensive undergraduate programs, highly regarded master's programs, and the outstanding accomplishments of its alumni. It is one of only 188 business colleges in the world to hold both business and accounting accreditation by AACSB International. It is also the only college of business in a public university in Illinois that has earned STEM designation for all its master's programs.

College of Education prepares early childhood through middle-level teachers, special educators, and administrators in addition to partnering with departments across the University to offer teacher education programs in a wide variety of academic programs and areas of study. With 44 accredited teacher education programs and offerings at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels, Illinois State remains true to its founding as Illinois State Normal University, specializing in teacher education. The College of Education is also home to Metcalf and University High School Laboratory Schools serving approximately 1,000 students.

College of Engineering enrolled its first cohort of students in fall 2025 with an initial offerings of electrical, mechanical, and general engineering degree programs. The college is uniquely designed with a vision of student success, diversity, and workforce development. Leveraging Illinois State's reputation as a student-focused institution, the College of Engineering prepares students for success by melding theory and practice in core engineering disciplines and innovative

cross-disciplinary experiences.

offers nursing degrees at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels. Building on the rich history of nursing education at Mennonite College, established in 1919, the College of Nursing was incorporated into the University in 1999 as Illinois State's sixth academic college. The college is proud of NCLEX and FNP pass rates consistently exceeding state and national averages and offers a state-of-the-art Nursing Simulation Center with a range of clinical placements that prepare students to practice in a complex health care system.

Wonsook Kim College of Fine

Arts includes the Wonsook Kim School of Art; the School of Music; School of Theatre, Dance, and Film; and the School of Creative Technologies. University Galleries, the Illinois Shakespeare Festival, Theatre for Young Audiences, the String Project, and the Big Red Marching Machine are also housed within the Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts. Notable alumni include Jane Lynch, Sean Hayes, Brendan Hunt, Nicolas Africano, LaRoyce Hawkins, Gary Cole, Judith Ivey, Terry Kinney, John Malkovich, Laurie Metcalf, Jeff Perry, Cecilia Suárez, and Michelle Williams.

Milner Library personnel work closely with academic units to provide services and research materials across the academic spectrum. Subject liaisons collaborate with faculty in all colleges, schools, and departments on information fluency instruction, collection development, and research assistance. Group study areas, quiet floors, collaboration stations, and a technology-rich environment support varied student learning styles. Library resources support textbook affordability initiatives, open-access publishing, and primary source research. Milner is home to distinctive collections in Special Collections and the University Archives as well as a Federal Depository Collection of government information begun in 1858.

Strategic Plan

The University's strategic plan, *Excellence by Design: 2024-2030*, approved by the Board of Trustees in the spring of 2024, is a shining example of the University's commitment to shared governance, with faculty, staff, students, and campus stakeholders playing an active role in contributing to the creation of the document. Guided by a strong foundational design and building on our past strategic plan, *Educate*• *Connect* • *Elevate: Illinois State: 2018-2023*, the plan emphasizes Illinois State's commitment to excellence through continued improvement to shape an exciting future.

Excellence by Design: 2024-2030 affirms our seven core values: Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Scholarship; Individualized Attention; Equity, Diversity, Access, and Belonging; Collaboration; Community and Civic Engagement; Respect; and Integrity. By acting on these values, we create a learning environment that results in our university being the first-choice public university in Illinois for high-achieving, motivated students who seek an individualized educational experience combined with the resources of a large university.

With its four strategic directions—Cultivate a Culture of Success and Belonging, Foster a Culture of Responsible Stewardship, Elevate our Institutional Excellence, and Expand Mutually Beneficial Partnerships—*Excellence by Design:* 2024-2030 serves as a practical guide for all units within the University for planning and resource allocation decisions. This plan guides Illinois State as it forges a new educational path across the next five years.

Master Plan

The Master Plan presents a long-range blueprint for the physical development of Illinois State University—its future size, form, function, character, image, and environment. The plan presents a series of recommendations designed to further the University's physical transformation beyond what has been accomplished in recent years. These recommendations have been tailored to support and enhance the University's strategic plan. A mid-plan review is currently underway.

FIRST-CHOICE INSTITUTION

Illinois State has welcomed our largest freshman class in history. We enroll more than 21,500 students, while maintaining academic quality and small class sizes.



BANG FOR THE BUCK

or over 100 years, Mennonite College of Nursing (MCN) has strived for innovation and excellence in nursing education and contributions to nursing science. MCN's mission is to prepare nurses who are engaged, well-informed members of society capable of advancing the health and quality of life for all people. MCN aspires to be a national leader in preparing exceptional nurses who are culturally responsive practitioners, scholars, educators, leaders and innovators in providing equitable health care. Building on century-old traditions and Illinois State University's values, the Mennonite College of Nursing values:

MCN offers a full complement of on campus and online programs, including prelicensure, RN-BSN, and accelerated bachelor's degrees, a Master of Science in Nursing with a track for family nurse practitioners (FNP), nursing leadership and administration, and post-master's certifications for FNP and psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners. The college's suite of doctoral programs includes a fully online Doctor of Nursing Practice and the only Ph.D. in nursing science program in downstate Illinois.

The college is growing! With support from the University, MCN has increased undergraduate enrollment, and now serves over 1,200 students without compromising on quality. Undergraduate students are retained and graduate at rates above national averages and reliably perform above the national average on the NCLEX licensure examination. Likewise, FNP certification pass rates are consistently above the national average and U.S. News & World Report has ranked the M.S.N. program among the best. MCN's doctoral students are clinicians, leaders, and scholars who are making a difference in the science and practice of nursing.

The college is housed in two locations, one in Normal, which offers undergraduate and graduate programs and includes a 26,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art Nursing Simulation Center and a range of clinical placements that prepare students to practice in a complex health

care system. In 2023, MCN partnered with Memorial Health Services, expanding undergraduate educational opportunities in south-central Illinois, with a target of providing 96 additional undergraduate nursing seats.

MCN faculty are recognized nationally and internationally for research related to cardiovascular health, chronic illness, aging, symptom science, and wellness. The college and university offer substantial support for research and scholarly activities, including a robust pre- and post-award system, publishing and statistical consulting, and mentorship. Illinois State University and MCN offer an excellent environment for nurse academics seeking balance between scholarship and teaching along with a high quality of life in a welcoming environment. With just under 80 full-time faculty and staff in the college, there are many opportunities for collaboration.

Overall, excellence is espoused in every facet of the college. MCN's core values are fundamental for upholding the public's trust in the profession and fulfilling ethical obligations while cultivating future generations of nurses.

Dean, Mennonite College of Nursing

Ilinois State University—a nationally ranked public R2 university committed to teaching, scholarship, civic engagement, and inclusive excellence—invites applications and nominations for the position of dean of Mennonite College of Nursing. The University recognizes that our commitment to the inclusion of all students, faculty, and staff enriches the educational and cultural experiences of the entire campus and greater community. To that end, we invite applications from individuals who share these values and will work to advance the University's continued commitment to equity, diversity, access, and belonging for all.

Illinois State University seeks a strategic and innovative academic leader committed to the mission, vision, and values outlined in the University's strategic plan. The dean is the chief academic and executive officer of the college, providing leadership in the context of shared governance. The dean leads the development and implementation of the college's strategic future, and reports to the provost, who also serves as vice president for academic affairs.

The dean's overarching responsibilities are to develop an effective collegial environment that supports excellence in teaching, scholarship, and service, and advances the profession of nursing. The dean facilitates collaborations within the college, university, and broader community. The dean provides leadership that advances the University's commitments through extramural funding as well as internal and external partnerships. The dean provides leadership and support efforts to advance equity, diversity, access, and belonging to effectively serve all students, faculty, and staff in the college. The dean must be committed to

continued excellence in undergraduate and graduate nursing education; faculty support for scholarship, and research activities, including extramural funding; and partnerships with regional hospitals and health care facilities. The dean will engage college faculty, staff, and students in developing a shared plan for the future of the college and its role in the broader mission of the University.

The dean serves as the academic leader; advocates on behalf of the college to the provost and president; and engages with donors, alumni, and external constituents to seek support and other resources for the college. The dean oversees promotion- and tenure-standards in the college to promote excellence in instruction; provides leadership to expand scholarship, scholarly outcomes, and grant activity; and supervises the college leaders and dean's office staff. The dean assumes fiscal responsibility for the college.

The dean reports to the vice president for academic affairs and provost, who reports to Illinois State University's president. Personnel reporting to the dean include an associate dean; an assistant dean for student services; and the directors of the Nursing Simulation Center, technology support services, college events, college marketing and recruitment, and college business and finance. The dean works closely with the college's director of development for philanthropic support and college facilities planners. The dean is expected to work collaboratively and collegially with seven other academic deans as well as administrators from all four divisions of the University.

The 12-month position has a preferred starting date of July 1, 2026.

FOR LEADERSHIP

The dean for the Mennonite College of Nursing must possess the intellectual vision and energy necessary to lead a complex, comprehensive college of higher education to its future as a top preparer of nurses and advance degree clinicians and researchers. The dean must be able to develop and promote shared core values while being responsive to the needs of students, staff and faculty.

The new dean will be asked to address the following critical leadership issues, among others:

- Represent the University, college, and academic units to external constituents and advance outreach and public service efforts by nurturing and building statewide, national, and international partnerships.
- Represent the college internally to the campus community and lead collaboration within the college and among university units.
- Provide leadership to college faculty as they enact the curricular, pedagogical, and scholarly endeavors associated with challenges in nurse preparation, educational research, and policy development.
- Lead college efforts to sustain and grow student enrollment, retention, and graduation rates among other indicators of student success.
- Develop budgets and align fiscal resources to strategic priorities and identify opportunities to grow resources in mission-consistent ways.
- Lead recruitment, selection, retention, and supervision of faculty and college administrative staff in a manner that promotes excellence in instruction, practice, scholarship, and service.

- Lead and oversee the annual appointment, salary, promotion, and tenure process in a unionized faculty environment.
- Promote and support college personnel and student equity, diversity, access, and belonging in teaching, scholarship, and service.
- Lead the college's fundraising efforts. Work closely with University Advancement to collaborate in the University's college and overall fundraising efforts.
- Coordinate with partners and health care leaders across the state to promote the nursing profession and innovative healthcare practices.
- Support and facilitate instructional and research opportunities for faculty, staff, and students.
- Foster sustainable growth in the college's research enterprise as well as guide and support principal investigators of large extramural grants.
- Implement an inclusive college strategic plan in alignment with the University's strategic plan.
- Coordinate management of facilities and associated infrastructure allocated to the college.
- Provide leadership and oversight for the academic programs in the college, periodically reviewing, revising, or developing academic programs.
- Fulfill other duties as may be assigned by the provost and president.

- Hold at least one graduate degree in nursing and hold a terminal degree in nursing or a related field from an accredited institution of higher learning.
- A record of outstanding scholarship and teaching, meriting appointment as professor with tenure in the Mennonite College of Nursing at Illinois State University.
- A record of full-time administrative leadership experience in dynamic academic organizations, with a record of accomplishments in roles such as dean, associate dean, department chair, or school director, or comparable full-time leadership role.
- A record of aligning fiscal resources with strategic priorities and demonstrated innovative fiscal management accomplishments as a manager of people and resources in support of high-quality graduate and undergraduate instruction, scholarly productivity, nursing practice, and outreach activities.
- Fundamental understanding of the scholarly, teaching, and service responsibilities of a college of nursing faculty member at an R2 university.

- Experience with the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education for program accreditation.
- Knowledge of or experience in fundraising and donor stewardship.

LEADERSHIP

Dr. Aondover Tarhule, President



r. Aondover Tarhule joined Illinois State University in 2020 as vice president for academic affairs and provost and currently serves as president. His immediate prior administrative appointment was vice provost and dean of the Graduate School at Binghamton University (State University of New York). Before that, he was executive associate dean and department chair in the College of Atmospheric and Geographic Sciences at the University of Oklahoma. In these positions, he worked on creating new academic programs, increasing student enrollment, increasing diversity, faculty retention, shared governance, and international partnerships and linkages.

Having earned master's degrees and a doctoral degree in geography from McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, Tarhule received a postdoctoral fellowship from the Canadian Science Advisory Council to conduct research at Queens University in Kingston, Ontario, Canada. Tarhule earned an additional master's degree in environmental resources planning and a bachelor's degree in geography, both from the University of Jos, Plateau State, Nigeria.

A broadly trained physical geographer, Tarhule has wide-ranging research interests in hydroclimatic variability, droughts, water resources

scarcity, and climate information dissemination and use. His scholarly research has appeared in prestigious international journals, including *Nature* (*Scientific Reports, Climate Perspectives*), *Journal of Hydrology, Remote Sensing*, and *Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society*, and book chapters. His efforts as principal investigator (PI) or co-PI have resulted in more than \$5 million in grants from such agencies as the National Science Foundation, the United States Agency for International Development, the National Institutes of Health, and the United States Geological Survey. He has served on the editorial board of the *Scientific World Journal* and the *African Geographical Review*, and as guest editor on several journals including *Remote Sensing, Atmosphere*, and *Climate Research*.

Tarhule has served on committees of prominent national and international organizations, including as consultant to the World Bank (Climate Risk Assessment of the Niger River Basin Sustainable Development Action Plan) and member of the Executive Committee of the Board on Oceans, Atmosphere, and Climate, and Association of Public and Land Grant Universities. He is a member of the College of Mentors of the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa (CODESRIA) and an executive board member of the Walker Institute, University of Reading, in England.

LEADERSHIP

Dr. Ani Yazedjian, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost



r. Ani Yazedjian, University Professor, joined the Office of the Provost in 2019 as associate provost and currently serves as vice president for academic affairs and provost. In her role as associate provost, Yazedjian oversaw new program development through the Illinois Board of Higher Education and institutional accreditation through the Higher Learning Commission, and was actively involved in the creation of the new College of Engineering. On campus, she supervised the Center for Civic Engagement, the Office of International Education, and University Assessment Services. Yazedjian served on the University strategic planning steering team and the COVID-19 steering team.

Yazedjian has also served as chair of the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences at Illinois State. As chair, she led the increase in the number of degree programs in the department, developed the first accelerated master's degree programs on campus, created a new online dietetic internship certificate, increased student enrollment, oversaw over \$1 million in equipment and facilities upgrades, and secured donor contributions for five new scholarships. She was named a University Professor in 2013 and received the University's Distinguished Service Award in 2023.

Over the last two decades, Yazedjian has received over \$7 million to support her scholarly interests in delivering evidence-based programs to support adolescent development. Most recently, between 2015 and 2020, she directed the *CARE4U* program which provided over 1,100 primarily African American and Hispanic youth with relationship education, job readiness, and financial management skills in order to support their successful transition to adulthood. In 2021, she received the Marie F. Peters Award from the National Council on Family Relations, a biennial recognition given to a distinguished scholar, researcher, or practitioner who has made significant contributions to the area of racial and ethnic diversity in families.

Prior to her time at Illinois State, Yazedjian was a faculty member in the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences at Texas State University. In 2010, she was appointed as presidential fellow where she served on the president's cabinet and focused on developing and implementing internationalization efforts across campus. She earned a doctorate and master's degree in human and community development from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and a bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Florida.

Nationally, Yazedjian has served in leadership roles with the National Council on Family Relations, the Council for Accreditation of the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences, and the Council for Administrators in Family and Consumer Sciences. She was selected by the Higher Education Resource Services for the Wellesley Institute, which develops women leaders in higher education.

In the local community, she has been involved with the Family and Consumer Science Professionals of McLean County and volunteered with Junior Achievement. She also served for six years on the board of the Multicultural Leadership Institute.
